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WE were always pleased to see ingenious examples of recycling in a letterbox. Some of the rarer cases were a scuba tank, an off-board motor and an old truck radiator grill serving a second life at the gatepost. Retired buoys, rusting milk churns and old wooden barrels were more common. So popular were burnt-out microwaves as a delivery recipient, we eventually stopped photographing them.

The distribution of home-made letterboxes would vary considerably. Arthurs Point near Queenstown was the first hotspot we came across, while Northland as a whole was awash with them. So, too, were parts of the Coromandel Peninsula, Queen Charlotte Dr in the Marlborough Sounds, and sections of the West Coast. By contrast, the central North Island appeared to be a dry spot. During a week's travel through this part of the country, we saw only one or two. Of course, there are many roads and streets we didn't cover. No doubt there were hundreds of letterboxes that eluded us.

Down here in the south, the customised letterboxes were memorable for their quality and innovation.

Coming to the end of our travels, we circled round from the Catlins to Fiordland and were given one last blast of Kiwi domestic creativity at its finest. Particularly impressive were some whale and dolphin letterboxes made from corrugated metal and a spooky pumpkin-face letterbox carved into a tree stump. Near Te Anau, we passed the most surrealist letterbox of the lot. It comprised a stovepipe hat atop a bodyless pair of legs. Epitomising many of the other designs we'd seen around the country, the thinking behind this was clearly outside of the box.
